"In praise to the Lord!"



Heart to Heart Sisters

Recently, Stephanie, a sister in Christ, informed our local LWML group that her doctor had given her an unusual prescription. He told her it was good to give many hugs each day. (Some experts even suggest at least 12 a day for good health.) This doctor, however, went even farther and instructed her to always hug "heart to heart" — your heart touching the other person's heart. This prescription is good for both hearts and increases good health results for two people.

Since that time I have been more aware of "heart to heart" hugs. But what is puzzling to me is that my first inclination is NOT to go "heart to heart" but just the opposite. I have to intentionally look at the other person and think about my action.

The more I've experienced my normal inclination and corrected it, the more I've been struck by this action as a metaphor for our "heart to heart" sisters in LWML. As we embrace women from other cultures, we learn the of the health such a "hug" can bring. Heart to heart is of benefit to all of us!

But, it is not our first inclination. It takes effort and awareness to recognize the "heart" of the other person and intentionally embrace that heart, making ourselves vulnerable as we come together.

I would encourage you to give "heart to heart" hugs to your friends and especially to a person of another culture. I know I will try to do so.

You are no longer strangers and aliens but fellow citizens with God's people and members of God's household (Ephesians 2:19 NIV).

The Scholarship Committee is excited to announce that the revised application for the 2019-2020 academic year is now available on the Washington-Alaska District web page. Instead of one form for new applicants and another for returning recipients, there is now only one application. Additional information is required from new applicants.

Applications have also been sent directly to this year's recipients. If you know potential candidates, please encourage them to apply for these scholarships. Post graduate students are eligible for up to \$2000 per academic year and undergraduates are eligible for up to \$1000 per year.
