Water for Life

Summer is soon upon us; and by all indications, it is going to be a dry one. The prognosticators are predicting a drought for Washington this year. (Sorry, Alaskan ladies, I don't follow your weather.) Water is central to all life. Sometimes it seems we go from one extreme to the other — from an over-abundance to a severe lack. But there is one place where water and life are a constant:

"Therefore every Christian has enough in Baptism to learn and to practise [sic] all his life; for he has always enough to do to believe firmly what it promises and brings: victory over death and the devil, forgiveness of sin, the grace of God, the entire Christ, and the Holy Ghost with His gifts. [42] In short, it is so transcendent that if timid nature could realize it, it might well doubt whether it could be true. [43] For consider, if there were somewhere a physician who understood the art of saving men from dying, or, even though they died, of restoring them speedily to life, so that they would thereafter live forever, how the world would pour in money like snow and rain, so that because of the throng of the rich no one could find access! But here in Baptism there is brought free to every one's door such a treasure and medicine as utterly destroys death and preserves all men alive." (Martin Luther's Large Catechism, Baptism, paragraphs 41-43).

If you spend the summer parched, give thanks to God for the abundant water in the font of life by which He gives you eternal life. If the rains return with a vengeance next fall and winter, take the soaking as an opportunity to remember and give thanks for *the washing of rebirth and renewal by the Holy Spirit* (Titus 3:5) granted you at the font.

Structure Committee

Stop the Presses!

The phrase "stop the presses" stems from the newspaper industry. If the content of an issue needed to be revised during its printing, the printing press was stopped and content amended. This could cause delay and expense, so was generally reserved for highly significant content changes.

In our lives and in ministry, we need to "stop the presses" and be proactive about change as well. Your local group or zone may be dedicating time and resources to updating your bylaws or are planning to do so in the near future. If that's the case, **first** look at the sample bylaws on the LWML website to ensure that your revisions are in line with the recommended wording and format of the LWML. That will save time and ensure that you are submitting a document to the district Structure Committee that best reflects your group's ministry focus.

Also, LWML is updating some terms in order to better reflect today's language. "Societies" are now referred to as "local groups." If you are updating your bylaws, the Structure Committee requests that you include that change. Refer to the sample bylaws on the LWML website through the link provided for more information. 



Applications for scholarships for the 2019-2020 academic year have been received and are being reviewed. One of the 2018-2019 scholarship recipients, Kurt Hellwig, thanked the LWML Washington-Alaska District for its support. During the fall term, his wife Clara completed her student teaching in California while he began his course work at Concordia Seminary in St. Louis. Clara is now with Kurt in St. Louis and will be teaching Spanish and Technology at Lutheran High School of St. Charles, Missouri, next year.

Kurt shared that during January, he took an intensive elective on Church Planting and Revitalization. The class took several trips to new churches that were doing well and also to churches that had enjoyed revitalization. One congregation they visited had dwindled to about 30 members and seriously considered closing. They called a new minister who worked tirelessly to restore trust and hope to both current and former members. A decade later, 500 people worship at the church! God be praised!!

Kurt served 40 hours as an assistant chaplain at a senior living facility near the seminary. He found it encouraging to witness the faith of these seniors. Many are physically or mentally unable to do what they used to, but Kurt knows that God hears their prayers and that these seniors are helping form empathetic pastors who visit their people.

The following students are receiving LWML Washington-Alaska District scholarships for the 2018-2019 academic year.

Rick McCafferty is enrolled in the Ethnic Immigrant Institute of Theology program which is largely online but requires some time on the Concordia Seminary campus in St. Louis.

Hannah Freeman is enrolled at Concordia Lutheran University at Mequon, Wisconsin. She plans to become a parish musician.

Michele Musegades Doel continues her studies at Concordia Seminary at St Louis to achieve her goal of becoming a deaconess.

Ben Maxson is enrolled in the Specific Ministry Program online with Concordia Seminary in St. Louis and attends classes on campus a short time each year. He plans to become a pastor.

Kurt Hellwig graduated from Concordia University in Irvine, California, this spring and is attending Concordia Seminary in St. Louis with plans to become a pastor.

Obituary – Past District President Alice Niemeier



NIEMEIER, Alice Emma (Age 95) Alice Niemeier went to be with her Lord on April 29, 2019. She was born on June 10, 1923, to Fred and Ella Garlich on a small farm near Pipestone, MN. She was the youngest of three children.

After high school she moved to Santa Monica, CA, and worked as a "Rosie the Riveter" during WWII. There she married her first husband, Robert Carlson and had a daughter, Sandra, and a son, Jimmy (deceased). She later moved to Spokane, where a handsome Air Force Sergeant caught her eye. She married Lorenz (Larry) Niemeier and had another daughter, Marlene. They began the Air Force life of many moves and Larry's remote assignments. Alice made many lifelong friends during these travels before she and Larry retired in Spokane. Larry went to his Lord in 1985. Alice was a member of St. John's Lutheran Church and was active in the Lutheran Women's Missionary League, serving as district president. Alice was honored with a Lifetime Achievement award by the YWCA in 2013. Alice had a collection of over 100 vintage hats which she loved sharing at luncheons and fund raisers. Trust in God's Fruit of the Spirit

Wherever we go, we should all have a welcoming attitude towards everyone (Titus 3: 4-7). Each person is a child of God — regardless of background, looks, or actions. As a Heart to Heart Sister, we can welcome women of diverse ethnic groups. We can acknowledge and appreciate that all Sisters in Christ have different cultures that manifest the fruits of the Spirit in different ways. We can also be a witness for women who do not yet know Christ. We do this by understanding their cultures and beliefs and then sharing the fruits of the Spirit with them.

An example of the fruits of the Spirit, such as love and kindness, manifesting itself differently in different cultures is seen in the celebration of the coming of a newly born child. Some cultures traditionally shower love and kindness towards the mother and give her presents before her baby is born. In other cultures, people will traditionally shower love and kindness towards the baby after the child is born as a celebration of its life. While the "how" and "when" to celebrate a new baby is different, the fruit of the Spirit — the love and kindness towards the mother and child — is still the same. It is ever present through the people who attend the baby shower, whether before or after the birth. It is present in believers and non-believers alike.

As Heart to Heart Sisters, we can learn many traditions that help make women feel welcome and witness to non-believers by relying on God's fruits of the Spirit. By opening our hearts and minds we welcome new members to Christ's eternal family.

But the fruit of the Sprit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control; against such things there is no law (Galatians 5:22).


