Greetings from the Structure Committee! We are gearing up to begin the process of updating the district bylaws for the convention body's review and approval at the 2026 convention in Spokane.

However, there is a major change at the national level that we are going to address in this article. The LWML is proposing to change its Treasurer position to an appointed position instead of an elected one. Here is their rationale for the change:

Rationale:

The LWML Board of Directors (BOD) will appoint the Treasurer, rather than this officer being elected by the convention body.

- The Lutheran Women's Missionary League has grown significantly in recent years and is now a multi-million-dollar 501(c)(3) organization. It is imperative that the Treasurer has financial, banking, and/or accounting education and/or experience.
- When possible, potential appointees will be invited to serve on the Finance and Operations Committee or the Investment Committee to give them LWML experience before being appointed by the BOD as Treasurer."

For everyone's information, we, the district Structure Committee, <u>will not be proposing this change for</u> <u>the district treasurer position at the 2026 convention in Spokane.</u> Here is our rationale for not proposing this change yet:

1. The current term for the district treasurer position will not expire until the 2028 convention. Changes to the bylaws regarding the position can be made at that time.

2. While the district treasurer position does not have the same complexity level as the LWML position, it is a complex position, nonetheless. Just knowing how to balance a personal checkbook is not enough proficiency for the position. Proficiency in double entry bookkeeping is encouraged as the district has multiple bank accounts and investment accounts to manage properly.

3. Multiple committees and elected officials will need to be part of the feasibility review for making the district treasurer position an appointed position versus an elected one. The Nominating Committee and Structure Committee will need to be included in the review process along with the 2026-2030 district president and Vice President of Organizational Resources.

The Structure Committee will wait until after the 2026 convention to start the feasibility review of the change. It is important that the feasibility review be done first to determine if the change is worthwhile to recommend to the 2028 convention body.

Please reach out to the Structure Committee with any questions or concerns you may have about the LWME's proposal to make their Treasurer position an appointed position, and its impact on the district.

Martha, Mary, and Mothers

Jesus said to Martha, "I am the resurrection and the life. Whoever believes in me, though he die, yet shall he live, and everyone who lives and believes in me shall never die. Do you believe this?" "Yes, Lord," she said, "I believe you are the Christ, the Son of God, who was to come into the world" (John 11:25-27 NIV).

Martha's story is one that has always resonated with me. Like Martha, my mother and grandmother had both a stalwart faith and a skill for creating places of comfort in which the Word of God could thrive. For Mary to have the opportunity to sit listening at the Lord's feet (Luke 10:38-42), there needed to be Martha, with her ability to organize food and lodging (for twelve disciples!) and a welcoming place in which to hear the Word of God. It is easy to imagine that in her practicality, Martha was the one who made sure to send a messenger to Jesus as her brother Lazarus lay dying (John 11:1). When Jesus came, she went out to meet Him, her faith still rock-solid, despite her brother's death. *"But I know even now God will give you whatever you ask"* (John 11:23), she said. Later, six days before the Lord's last Passover, we learn that: *Here a dinner was given in Jesus' honor*. *Martha served* (John 12:2a). Again Martha, in her love for the Lord, creates a sheltering place of love and warmth for Jesus and His disciples in the stormy days before His crucifixion (John 12:1-3).

As for all women who carry the load of caring for others, Jesus gently reminds Martha to prioritize faith above the daily hubbub (Luke 10:41-42), but this is neither a rebuke of the doer (Martha) nor the dreamer (Mary), both of whom are valued by our Lord. Instead, it is a reminder that sometimes when life is most hectic, we need to take time to listen, to quiet our body and soul with God's nourishment. Through prayer, worship, and in His Word, we are strengthened and sustained us for the work Christ has given us here on earth!

I thank God for both the doers and the dreamers in my life! Both bring a respite of peace in a chaotic world: the comfort of a well-run, Christ-centered home and the security and peace that comes from knowing that through faith in Jesus, by God's grace, we have a Savior who forgives and renews us every day, promising us eternal life in heaven. **Serving the Lord with Gladness!**God gives each of us unique gifts that can be used in His Vineyard – both doer and dreamer! Beyond Sight

Downsizing is on my mind. I started the downsizing process with books in my bookcase that were in the "I'll read it someday" category. I pulled a book from that grouping entitled *Beyond Sight God's Vision for Using Ordinary People to Impact the World* by Gayle Sommerfeld, Founder of MOST Ministries with Sandra Sommerfeld Helm.

This book was exactly what I needed. I recently had cataract surgery, and I had a two-month waiting period before I could get my glasses. As I read the book *Beyond Sight*, I hurt for people in other parts of the world who were experiencing vision problems without the availability of the medical expertise to which I am accustomed.

I appreciated Gayle's descriptions of the preparations necessary for short term missions which included collecting supplies and preparing mentally. Personal preparation begins with prayer! It is good to learn about the culture in the country in which you will be working. It is important to go with the mindset that you are a guest in the community and to accept people where they are as you help with the clinics and share Jesus. As you prepare for a short term mission trip, you will experience many emotions. You will also experience many emotions after you return home. Life will never be the same for you as you relive and remember the people in another culture you have come to love in a very short time.

You will discover that mission trips cost money. The short term mission committee can aid in that part of your planning. Any woman belonging to a church in The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod in the LWML Washington-Alaska District is invited to apply. Funds are available up to \$1,000 per person.

There were three Zone Joy Shop Servant Events.

- 1. Assemble Soup in a Jar & Cake in a Bag Kits for foster families. To be distributed through Village of Hope in Coeur d'Alene, Idaho.
- 2. Tie Fleece Blankets for Children to be used by Coeur d'Alene Police Department when children are taken from home due to emergency situations or for car accident victims.
- 3. Decorate Cards of Hope for Cancer Patients using crayons or felt markers for Phil's Friends which is a registered service organization of LCMS that sends Boxes of Hope to cancer patients.

I'm excited to be a delegate at our national LWML in Omaha as well as attending the Fall District Retreat in September. I have been truly blessed being a part of the LWML.

- The grant is mission-focused and will share the Gospel of JesusChrist.
- There is a governing unit, such as an LCMS church, LCMS district, recognized service organization (RSO), or LCMS partner church to which the ministry project regularly reports.
- The ministry has provided a financial statementor budget as part of the mission grant proposal.
- The ministry will be able to implement the project when funds are disbursed within the biennium in which they were voted on or the biennium following.
- The ministry is ongoing in nature, continuing after the grant monies have been expended.
- The ministry reflects the vision and mission priorities of the LCMS.
