




Our Mite Goal Needs Your Help!

Thankfulness for God's Abundant Blessings

Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God In Christ Jesus for you. (1 Thessalonians 5:16-18)

At one of my very first LWML gatherings, a woman from our church offered insight into her daily habit upon first rising from bed in the morning. She raised her window's blinds to the new day and, stretching hands upward in praise to God, took time to thank Him for His abundant blessings. God gives us such an embarrassment of riches, how can we not begin our days in thankfulness? Whether the sky be blue or gray outside our windows in the morning, it is wide and wonderful. The world in which we live is green with promise and ripe with the harvest. For our sake, God gave His Son, that we might have life and live it abundantly (John 10:10). Gratefulness is only fitting in the face of this unparalleled gift of grace!

Hold fast what is good (verse 21b), the apostle Paul continues in his letter to the church in Thessalonica. Have faith that for those who love God all things work together for good (Romans 8:28a), he writes in his letter to Rome. Studies abound that show how thankfulness is good for you. When I reflected on thankfulness "in all circumstances" from the verses in Thessalonians, I immediately thought of Job and the troubles he faced, while still remaining steadfast in the Lord (Job 19:25). Living in this digital age, I typed this into my search engine to find the verse I was thinking of, little realizing that it would interpret Job's name as "a job" and give me countless articles about how gratitude at work enhances workplace satisfaction! As Christians, the health benefits of thankfulness are not a mystery. The more gratitude, the more thankfulness, the more our hearts are free to reflect on God's mercies to us, uncrippled by the confining prison that worry can create. Physically it is said that our brains can get into a self-perpetuating groove of negative thoughts, but the same can be true of positive thoughts and thankfulness. We can make a habit of thankfulness to God, beginning with the blessings that are ours in Christ, blessings we sing of in the hymn *Great is Thy Faithfulness*, LSB 809: "Pardon for sin and a peace that endureth, thine own dear Presence to cheer and to guide; strength for today and bright hope for tomorrow, blessings all mine and ten thousand beside!"

As the Thanksgiving and Christmas seasons approach and our earthly work expands exponentially in churches and homes, it is an especially good time to center our days with gratitude and praise to the Lord. Do not be anxious about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus (Philippians 4:6-7).

Instead of being a month in which we become too busy for daily devotions, December might be the perfect month to begin reading the whole of the Bible, beginning with the wonder of Jesus' birth in Bethlehem! LWML's website has a calendar guide for reading through the entire Bible in one year and yes, we get to first read both the prophecies in Isaiah and the moment of Jesus' birth in Luke. Check

this out at lwml.org under the heading Gospel Outreach/Read through the Bible in One Year. You might even print out the suggested daily verse references for your LWML group! Stay in the thankfulness groove throughout the season of winter; allow your morning thankfulness to God to set each day's priorities! As the hymn says, "Take my moments and my days, let them flow in ceaseless praise" (Take my Life and Let it Be, LSB 783).

"The Waiting That Works: Advent Hope and Christmas Joy in the Life of the LWML"

Dear Sisters in Christ,

As the days grow shorter and the nights longer, we enter the holy season of Advent—a time of waiting, watching, and wondering. The world around us rushes toward Christmas with glitter and noise, but the Church slows down.

We light candles one by one, sing ancient hymns, and listen for the voice of one crying in the wilderness.

The seasons of Advent and Christmas are more than liturgical markers—they are invitations to live deeply into the rhythm of God's promises. Advent teaches us to wait. Christmas teaches us to rejoice. And both seasons remind us that our waiting is never idle, and our rejoicing is never shallow. Advent begins in shadows. The days grow shorter, the nights longer, and the world seems to groan under the weight of its own longing. The Church lights a candle and sings, "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel." We remember the prophets who waited centuries for the Messiah. We join Mary in her expectant hope. We echo John the Baptist's cry: "Prepare the way of the Lord!" But Advent is not passive. It is a season of active waiting—a time when faith rolls up its sleeves. That's where the LWML shines. You wait with purpose. You serve while watching. You give, pray, and go, even as you long for Christ's return. Your mite boxes are more than coins—they are candles lit in the darkness, signs of hope for missions near and far.

This Advent, I invite you to consider how your waiting is shaped by the Word. The prophet Isaiah declares, "Those who wait for the Lord shall renew their strength" (Isaiah 40:31). Waiting in faith is not weakness—it is strength. It is the strength to say, "God is at work, even when I cannot see it." It is the strength to serve others while trusting that Christ is coming soon.

And then comes Christmas. The angel's song breaks the silence: "Glory to God in the highest!" The shepherds run. Mary treasures. The Word becomes flesh and dwells among us. Christmas is not the end of waiting—it is the beginning of fulfillment. It is the joy of promises kept, the wonder of God with us.

For LWML women, Christmas is a time to rejoice in the fruits of faithful service. Every quilt stitched, every meal prepared, every devotion shared, every mission supported—these are echoes of the Incarnation. You bring Christ into the lives of others. You carry His light into nursing homes, prisons, schools, and sanctuaries. You are living nativity scenes—where Christ is born anew in acts of mercy and love.

Let me offer a pastoral encouragement: as you move from Advent into Christmas, don't rush past the waiting. Let it deepen your joy. Let it remind you that God's timing is perfect, and His promises are sure. And when Christmas dawns, rejoice not only in the birth of Jesus, but in the ways He continues to be born in your life, your service, and your witness. Paul writes, "Thanks be to God for His indescribable gift!" (2 Corinthians 9:15). That gift—Jesus Christ—is the heart of our hope and the source of our joy. May He renew your strength this Advent, and fill your heart with gladness this Christmas.

The Short Term Mission committee met face to face at the retreat in Kennewick, September 26-28. Two groups have taken advantage of the opportunity to obtain a grant for their short term mission trip activities. The short term mission grants enable one LCMS woman to be able to get funding for herself or to disperse with her mission team when an opportunity arises and not have to wait for up to two years to get funding.

The Short Term Mission committee has a budget of \$5,000 for the biennium. Of this amount \$1,400 has already been awarded. If you are thinking of participating in a mission event either near your home or away, this is a great opportunity to get up to \$1,000 to help you on your way. 

Anticipating the birth of our Lord Jesus Phrist

Thank you! Feeding Haitian Children for the Kingdom (Mission Grant #13) is now fully funded!

Thank you for your generous response to our Mite Challenge! LWML Washington-Alaska District Mission Grant #13 of our 2024-2026 biennium is now fully funded for the amount of \$10,000 through your mite donations! Trinity Hope's mission began in Haiti in 1999 with one school and 42 children and has grown to provide 62,000 children midday meals in over 281 Christian Schools. This is a shared partnership through which each school pays approximately 5% of the costs of purchasing food from Haitian vendors and paying a cook. This Shared Support is a way for Haiti not to become too dependent on Trinity Hope, while still providing students with nutritious meals. Our LWML WA-AK district grant of \$10,000 sponsors the meal program at one Haitian-Lutheran school, covering costs for approximately 200 meals per school day for one school year. Providing a noon meal for hungry children in our Lutheran schools in Haiti is a powerful witness used by the Holy Spirit to discredit the Voodoo teaching that God is unapproachable and non-responsive to Haitians. We pray this ministry is brings children and families to the knowledge of Christ, demonstrating the love of Jesus through word and deed in Haiti. Thank you, Lord, for the mission-minded dedication of your people throughout the WA-AK district who enabled the funding of this grant!



These 2024-2026 mission grants will be the next to be funded by your mites:

- Concordia International Radio Saves Lives Spiritually and Physically. Through this Mission Grant of \$2000, we will assist Ministry in Mission in subsidizing the operation of Concordia International Radio in Jacmel, Haiti, a station that helps deliver the Good News Gospel to the hurting people of Haiti during a time of great upheaval. Ministry in Mission is a Recognized Service Organization of the LCMS with 15 years of experience in Haiti. Extreme weather conditions caused Concordia International Radio's older equipment to age more quickly. In order to ensure a continuous, quality radio broadcast, funds are needed to assist in the purchase of three laptops, three multidirectional microphones, a 16-channel mixer, three hard drives, three fans, two tape recorders, six solar panels, and a power inverter. These radio equipment upgrades will enable the continued broadcast of Concordia International Radio to the people of Haiti.
- •Orphan Grain Train Reaching Out to Ukrainians. Orphan Grain Train has already relocated and provided assimilation and continued funding for Ukrainians who have fled the devastating war in Ukraine to the United States. With this grant of \$5000, Orphan Grain Train will provide for the spiritual and material needs of Ukrainians displaced by war to Norfolk, Nebraska, with funding for relocation, assimilation, and ongoing expenses as well as for Gospel Outreach.

These 2024-2026 mission grants will be the next to be funded by your mites (cont):

• Walking Together in the Mission Field – Alliance Missionaries LCMS. Alliance Missionaries are pastors supported by the budget of the LCMS. These men are either members of partner churches of the LCMS or men from countries in which mission work is beginning without a parent church body. Alliance Missionaries currently have such pastors in the Dominican Republic, Jamaica, Peru, Panama, Guatemala, Ethiopia, Uganda, Uruguay, South Africa, and undisclosed parts of Eurasia and Asia. Our grant of \$1500 helps fund the program "Walking Together in the Mission Field" from the LCMS Office of International Mission in support of Alliance Missionaries working alongside and together with LCMS missionaries, complementing and strengthening each other as they spread the Gospel and show mercy to hurting people.

LWML WA-AK Mission Grants Committee Prepares 2026–2028 Mission Grant Proposals for Voting!

The LWML WA-AK District Mission Grant Committee meets November 13th to begin processing the wonderful array of 2026–2028 Washington-Alaska District Mission Grant Proposals we received! First, the district's Mission Grant Committee will discuss all newly submitted grants and make sure all the materials are complete. The district grant proposals then go through a review process that includes review by the LWML Washington-Alaska District and the LCMS Northwest District Office. During this time, we will create an executive summary to capture the main points of the materials presented in the proposal documents, emphasizing how it extends the Gospel and serves the Lord through mission. The reviews will be performed with all available proposal documents, with the summary offering an abbreviated way to refer to each proposal.

Before the LWML district convention, district voting members may ask the LWML groups they represent to vote (each individual woman) on the slate of grant proposals. A compilation of these votes can be helpful, along with prayer and careful study, in guiding the voting member's mission grant vote at the convention. If your voting representative asks you to prayerfully consider the slate of 2026-2028 mission grant proposals and vote on them, please do so, knowing that your input is valuable and, in these votes, can lie the working of the Holy Spirit.

We pray the Lord will guide our convention votes in July; your mites will be supporting the missions that receive the most votes, within the budget set by the convention for the 2026-2028 biennium. Watch for descriptions of 2026–2028 district mission grant proposals to arrive in the months preceding the district convention, sent to your LWML group and zone presidents.

Greetings in the Name of our Lord Jesus Christ. Amen. Have you ever felt alone, the outcast, or just don't seem to fit in. Sometimes as a young women in LWML it can feel like that. I pray there will be more young women encouraged to be a part of the wonderful things God has for them through the time and talents of the LWML. So receive this challenge you loner young women, gather together, unite and gain confidence knowing you do belong, you are important, you are valuable! Come, let's hang out!


Reports from the Fall Retreat, Kennewick
